We want to invite you on a journey with us this December, a **Journey to Jesus** to wonder and discover who He is. God's Word tells us what Jesus was like. For example, the book of Isaiah promised even before Jesus arrived that he would be a faithful servant, the chosen one; and that God would put his spirit on him, and that he would bring justice to the nations (Isaiah 42:1-3). That passage in Isaiah is not the only place that tells us about who Jesus is and what he was like.

Each day this month on your journey of wonder, not only will you read passages that highlight different parts of Jesus' character and his unique qualities, but you can also move Jesus along the path of your journey. Use the star magnet to hang your map on your fridge and move your Jesus magnet along His path to the manger! We encourage you to talk with your family about what you learned about Jesus from each passage. (If you need a little help along the way, we have provided some guidance down below.) By the time Christmas day gets here, you will know so much about Jesus and can delight in Him for who He is!

Advent Mevotionals

An Invitation to



December abounds with opportunities to busy and distract us. The celebration of Advent is an invitation to slow down, to notice, to ponder, to linger.

The word "advent" simply means "arrival." We've created this guide as a chance for your family to set aside time each Sunday of Advent to remember the longing for the arrival of a Messiah felt by people long ago, and to recognize our own longing for the restoration and renewal of our world, our relationships, and our hearts.

This guide is designed for ages middle school through adult; feel free to use it in the way that best suits the needs of those in your home.

Christians have observed Advent for over 1500 years and traditionally have marked the weeks before Christmas with prayer, Scripture, and candle lighting. Each Sunday of Advent emphasizes a different theme—hope, peace, joy, and love.

The following guide contains an experience for each of the four Sundays of Advent as well as Christmas Day. Each one includes an opening prayer, Scripture readings, a brief devotion, discussion questions, a suggested Christmas carol, and a concluding prayer. We've also provided an optional "family challenge" to carry your Advent experience through the week.

We've provided a candle for you to use, or you may choose to purchase an Advent wreath with a separate candle for each Sunday (available on Amazon, Etsy, and elsewhere). Engage younger people in your home by inviting them to light or blow out the candle (where developmentally appropriate).

Many of the Old Testament verses you will read for Advent were written during a time when God's people were in exile. The kingdoms of Israel and Judah had been destroyed because of the wickedness and unfaithfulness of the people. Those who survived were sorry for their disobedience and longing for the arrival of one true King who would set things right.

May this guide help you take a few moments in the hustle and bustle of the season to reflect on the One whose arrival 2000 years ago changed everything.



First Sunday of Advent November 30

Gathering prayer

Invite someone to read this prayer (inspired by Psalm 25:5): "Guide us in your truth and teach us, for you are God our Savior, and our hope is in you all day long." Light the Hope candle. Take a moment to enjoy its flickering beauty and light.

Scripture readings

Read Isaiah 9:1-7. (Families with younger children may choose to just read Isaiah 9:6-7). Read Romans 8:22-25.

Devotion

The people of Israel knew what it was to wait in darkness. For centuries they looked forward to the day when God's promised Messiah would come and rescue them. Isaiah's prophecy gave them hope: a child would be born who would bring justice and peace. That hope kept them trusting when circumstances looked impossible. We, too, live in a world full of darkness and brokenness. But like Israel, we hold to hope—not wishful thinking, but the certainty that God keeps His promises. Just as Jesus came the first time, He will come again to set all things right. Advent is our season to wait with confidence: God's light has come, and His Kingdom will come in fullness.

What are you hoping for this Advent season?

Listen or sing together

"O Come, O Come Emmanuel" is a carol that captures the longing and hope of people waiting for the Messiah to arrive.

Concluding prayer

"Lord, thank You for the hope we have in Christ. As we wait for His return, fill us with confidence in Your promises and strength to keep walking in faith."

Blow out the candle or let it continue to burn

Family Challenge

Make a Hope Jar and fill it with that you are hoping for this Advent season. You can work on this throughout the week. Revisit on Christmas Day!





Second Sunday of Advent December 7

Gathering prayer

Invite someone to read this prayer (inspired by 2 Thessalonians 3:16): "May the Lord of peace himself give us peace at all times and in every way."

Light the Hope and Peace candles. Take a moment to enjoy their flickering beauty and light.

Scripture readings

Read Micah 5:2-5a and Philippians 4:4-7.

Devotion

In Micah's day, God's people were surrounded by enemies and weighed down by sin. They longed for peace. God promised a ruler to come from Bethlehem who would shepherd His people and bring true peace. That promise was fulfilled when Jesus was born—the Prince of Peace. But the peace He brings is deeper than the absence of conflict. It's reconciliation with God, the end of enmity (enemy-ness) between us and Him. And one day, when Jesus returns, He will bring perfect peace to all creation. Today we live in between: we know His peace in our hearts, even as we long for the day when conflict and fears will cease forever.

Where in your life are you feeling surrounded or weighed down? What is something we read today that can help you experience peace?

Listen or sing together

"I Heard the Bells on Christmas Day" is a carol that captures our longing for "peace on earth" and the promise of peace that Jesus' coming brings.

Concluding prayer

"Jesus, Prince of Peace, calm our anxious hearts and make us peacemakers in Your name. Give us courage to trust You as we wait for the day when Your perfect peace fills the earth."

Blow out the candles or let them continue to burn.

Family Challenge

Use the gift of peace to pass on peace others. Each family member picks one way to bring peace to someone self at school, work, home, church or in the neighborhood.





Third Sunday of Advent December 14

Gathering prayer

Invite someone to read this prayer (inspired by Psalm 16:11): "Lord, make known to us the paths of life; we know that in your presence there is fullness of joy." Light the Hope, Peace, and Joy candles. Take a moment to enjoy their flickering beauty and light.

Scripture readings

Read Isaiah 35:1-6 and Revelation 21:1-5. (Families with younger children may choose to just read Revelation 21:1-5.)

Devotion

The prophets described the coming of God's kingdom with images of joy: deserts blooming, the lame leaping, sorrow fleeing away. For God's people in exile, such joy seemed almost impossible. But the promise of redemption gave them reason to rejoice, even as they waited.

The angel announced Jesus' birth as "good news of great joy for all the people." His first coming brought joy because God had drawn near to save. And we await an even greater joy when Christ returns and wipes away every tear. Advent joy reminds us that our future is secure—no sorrow is stronger than God's promise.

When you think about the Christmas story, what brings you the most joy?

Listen or sing together

"Joy to the World" celebrates Jesus coming not just as a baby in a manger but the king who rules with truth and grace—what a reason to rejoice!

Concluding prayer

"Father, thank You for the joy that comes from knowing Jesus. Help us rejoice even in the waiting and give us eyes to see glimpses of Your joy breaking into our lives now." Blow out the candles or let them continue to burn.

Family Challenge

Plan a "joy surprise" for a family friend, a neighbor, a grandparent, a teacher, or a coworker. Write a note, bake some cookies, or draw a picture and surprise someone who may be in need of joy this season.





Fourth Sunday of Advent December 21

Gathering prayer

Invite someone to read this prayer (inspired by Psalm 90:14): "Satisfy us with your steadfast love, Lord, that we may rejoice and be glad all our days."

Light the Hope, Peace, Joy, and Love candles. Take a moment to enjoy their flickering beauty and light.

Scripture reading

Read Jeremiah 31:31-34 and 1 John 4:9-12.

Devotion

God's people longed for a new covenant that would heal their hearts and restore them to Him. His motivation was love—the love of a Father who would not abandon His children. That promise was fulfilled when God sent His only Son into the world.

The coming of Jesus is the ultimate demonstration of God's love, a love that saves and transforms. And when Christ comes again, we will experience His love in its fullness, face to face. Advent calls us to live in that love now—receiving it, being shaped by it, and sharing it freely with others.

"Jesus Loves Me" is one of the first songs many of us learned to sing. How does knowing Jesus loves you shape how you live?

Listen or sing together

"O Little Town of Bethlehem" reminds us that in God's great love He gave us a "wondrous gift." Jesus is indeed the best gift of all!

Concluding prayer

"Father, thank You for Your steadfast love shown through Jesus. Teach us to love others as You have loved us, as we wait for the day when Your love is all in all."

Blow out the candles or let them continue to burn.

Family Challenge

Share with each other one thing you really love and appreciate about each person in your home.



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Opening prayer

Invites someone to read this prayer (based on Isaiah 9:6): "Father, than you for sending your Son to be born to us and to be given to us. We praise Him as our Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, and Prince of Peace."

Light the Hope, Peace, Joy, Love, and Christ candles. Take a moment to enjoy their flickering beauty and light. Scripture readings

Read Matthew 1:18–23 and John 1:1–5, 14. (If you have time, also read through Luke 2:1-21.)

Devotion

On Christmas we celebrate that the waiting was not in vain. God has come. Jesus is Emmanuel, God with us. The eternal Word stepped into history, taking on flesh, bringing light into the darkness.

And this same Jesus will come again. Christmas joy looks back to Bethlehem and forward to the day when Christ will return and dwell with His people forever. Advent waiting gives way to Christmas celebration: our Savior has come, our Savior is coming again, and His presence changes everything.

How has this year's practice of Advent changed how you experience Christmas Day?

Listen or sing together

"Hark! The Herald Angels Sing" celebrates the arrival of the newborn king—Jesus, our Emmanuel!

Concluding prayer

"Jesus, we praise You for coming into our world as our Savior. Dwell with us today and always and prepare us for the joy of Your return."

Christmas Communion
